

Shaping the New Building Safety Regulator

- Implements recommendations of Dame Judith Hackitt's report following the Grenfell tragedy
- Introduced into Parliament in July 2021. Royal Assent is expected in Spring 2022
- Many new requirements could come in as early as April 2023. Build UK members need to prepare for changes to come.
- The Bill will introduce:
 - a new, more stringent, regulatory regime for England
 - a new Building Safety Regulator (BSR) established in HSE
 - a new construction products regime regulated by a new Construction Products Regulator

TO

Make provision about the safety of people in or about buildings and the standard of buildings, to amend the Architects Act 1997, and to amend provision about complaints made to a housing ombudsman.

Presented by Socretary Robert Jenrick supported by The Prime Minister, The Chancellor of the Exchequer, Secretary Priti Patel, Michael Gove, Secretary Robert Buckland, Secretary Kuasi Kwarteng, Secretary Thérèse Coffey and Christowher Pincher.

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- The BSR's three main functions will be to:
 - Lead the delivery of the new, more stringent regulatory regime for high-rise buildings in scope;
 - Promote competence for all buildings, including industry and professionals working on buildings, and building control bodies; and
 - Provide oversight for the safety and performance of all buildings.
- The BSR will operate proportionately and will be an evidence-led regulator.
- Aim to re-establish confidence in the system so that residents are safe – and feel safe – in their homes.



New Regulatory Regime – High-Rise Buildings

Building Safety Regulator HSE

- Buildings at least 18 metres in height, or at least 7 storeys, which contain at least two residential units.
- There will be hard stop 'Gateway' points throughout Design and Construction, where the BSR will be the Building Control Authority.
- Sufficient evidence submitted to the BSR before it approves work to progress through gateways.
- An Accountable Person will be responsible for managing the safety of the building once occupied.
 They must demonstrate this to the BSR through a Safety Case.



A new, more stringent regime in Design and Construction



- HSE became the Statutory Consultee for Planning Gateway One in August 2021.
- Throughout Procurement, Design and Construction, the new regulatory regime will:
 - Establish a system ('Gateways') to ensure compliance of building regulations at each stage;
 - Ensure that dutyholders are clearly identified and there is a clear line of accountability;
 - Mandate that anyone carrying out design or building work is competent;
 - Mandate for a 'golden thread' of building information to be created, stored and updated throughout the building's entire lifecycle; and
 - Establish mandatory reporting to the new BSR of fire and structural safety occurrences
 which could cause a significant risk to life safety.



Competence of Industry

- We will promote competence among industry
 professionals and regulators to raise standards in design,
 construction and the management of buildings.
- Much of the new industry requirements will mirror the requirements of CDM and will apply to <u>all building work</u>, not just HRB work.
- HSE has recruited experts to an Interim Independent Competence Committee to advise on competency issues and actions to be taken by HSE and industry.
- DLUHC have published draft regulations which can provide more details on current thinking for how this will work.







Building Safety Regulator HSE

- The BSR is tasked with improving the competence of building control bodies – both local authority and private sector - through proportionate competency frameworks, Codes of Conduct and operational standards.
- Building Control will become a regulated profession, accountable to the BSR. This will include, creating registers for Building Control Approvers and Building Inspectors.
- The BSR Chief Inspector of Buildings will be the Head of Profession.





What can you do to prepare?

- Get ready for the new system by beginning to understand your and your members' role in the new system.
- Consider whether you have the right skills, knowledge, experience and behaviours required.
- Share experiences and good practice in building risk management.
- Understand draft regulations and fact sheets published on the Parliament website.
- Contribute to Consultations planned for 2022.
